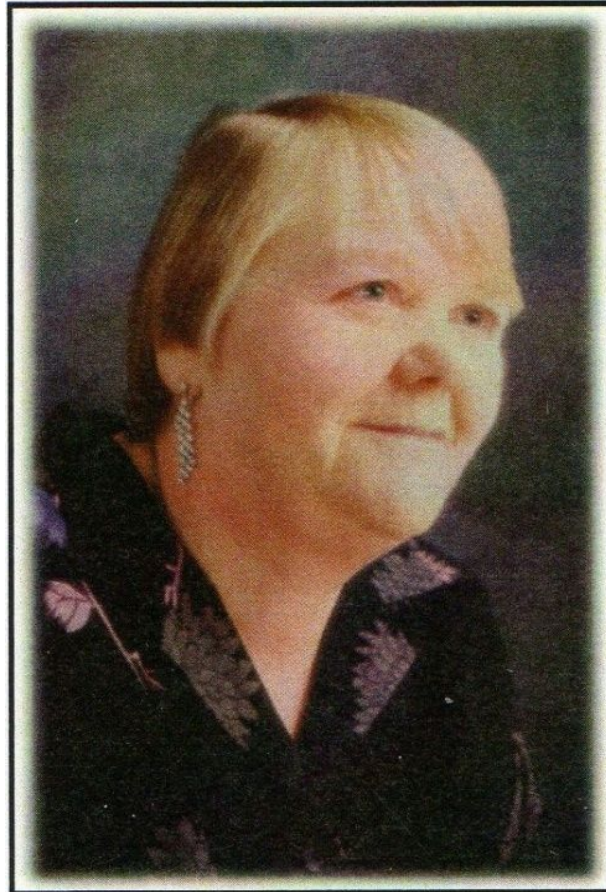

We Successfully Re-homed all these Siamese cats

We have had a busy year

After the Newsletter last November,

I had a call from a breeder who rescued four Siamese cats and successfully got them back to health. I put a Gentleman in touch with them to fostered them for a while, 2 Seals Merlin & Mimi male and female, I placed them in different homes in Leicestershire.

I put a lady from Milton Keynes in touch and i believe she had both a Blue tabby and a Red Point both boys but sadly i don't know how they are doing.

So i made a decision i would collect and place cats myself, which i have done successfully with the help of my other half.

Fudge

A Chocolate tabby point his owner was an elderly lady who had lost her husband and struggling to cope and was worried he would get his self ran over.

I contacted the gentleman who fostered Merlin & Mimi for a while, he said he would love to him and he settled in living in a rural location and enjoying hunting.

Smidge

A couple had a Seal tortie that wasn't getting on with their Bengal cross, so she went to live with Mimi in Leicestershire both settled in really well together.

Charlie & Lexi

These were from Lincolnshire, when we arrived they had changed their mind on the Charlie Chocolate point and just wanted us to home the lilac point female Lexi , The lady wanted Charlie but had Lexi instead, the bazaar thing was they lived next to each other the lady who want a cat loved Charlie and he was the reason she contacted me in the first place, but on th map it showed them at opposite ends of the road. But Lexi has settled in.

Tao (now Edward)

He was very noisy the lady lived in a flat and the neighbours were complaining so i placed him with a lady who has Siamese and now Edward enjoying being the only man and settled in.

Bluebell

A stray Seal point female who was looked after by the community and we placed her in a family home she has settled in.

Misty

A blue point that lives in Birmingham, no micro-chip the lady thought she was a stray and being attacked by two tom cats, so contacted me and i fetched her she was in call, then the owner phoned a day or so later and we returned her.

Russell (Now Jasper)

A stray found thought to be a Siamese i went to collect him and he was a Caramel Oriental Classic about a nine month old no microchip we took him to

the vets to be tested, held on to him for a few weeks then he was neutered and went to share a home with a Siamese who are great friends.

Suzy

The RSPCA contacted me asked if i would take a Seal point Siamese from them because she was attacking their staff and could only be handled with gauntlets and they couldn't do anything with her. She's a Snowshoe. So after a quite a few weeks and her being spayed she was successfully re-homed on her own she is coming along nicely.

Polly & Tilly

Seal Point & Chocolate point very sad they couldn't stay in their home they were also re-homed successfully.

Tuts & Lu

Seal point male and female another very sad situation where they needed a new home, I knew Tuts from years ago i placed him in that home when Pat Hadfield was the Welfare Officer for the Rescue so we go way back anyway they have settled in nicely after several weeks pictured in the Rescue Calendar laying with a ginger dsh called Hercules.

Chrissy

A deaf Lilac Point female a very sad situation but has gone to a lovely home where she is being well pampered.

Seiko

A lilac point male another sad situation where he was attacking another male cat in his home, but has been placed on his own settled in well.

Mr Darcy

Seal tabby point, he was attacking another male cat in his home, but has been placed on his own waiting to hear how he has settled

Black Cats

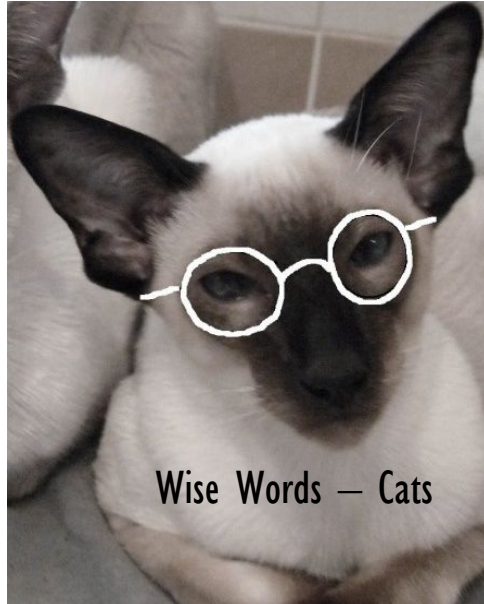
It is believed that the Siamese cat had Eastern origins coming from the palaces and temples of Bangkok. Some think it was a naturally occurring mutation of an all-black cat. Siamese were first imported into this country in the late 19th century and in some of the first litters an odd black kitten appeared. Breeders didn't regard them as unusual and often thought of them as an asset.

Genetically the first imported Siamese carried both blue and chocolate colours. The colours were probably dark as breeders thought of them as poor seals. In the early 20th century Russian Blue breeding was introduced into some Siamese lines. A Seal point Siamese was mated to a Russian Blue which resulted in a litter of all black kittens. Two sisters from this litter were mated to Seal point stud cats and one male from one of the resulting litters was mated to a female from the other litter. This mating produced a litter containing the blue points, Laurentide Ephree Amethyst and Laurentide Ephree Aquamarine (F3 generation). Amethyst mated to a blue point stud produced a litter with a lilac point kitten, Laurentide Mercury. Aquamarine was mated with another blue point stud and the resulting litter contained a blue point kitten that later became Champion Browndreys Marine. Both these cats were registered on the full Siamese register and are probably in pedigrees, way far back, in some of the blue and lilac pointed cats of today.

Often, when a Siamese mates with a Moggie cat the offspring are all black. Genetically, black is a dominant colour which may account for some of these kittens. From a mixed mating however, the kittens do not necessarily inherit the temperature sensitive gene (Himalayan gene) from their Siamese parent. This gene restricts the colour to the cooler parts of the body producing a pointed cat. Kittens from the moggie mating without this gene would then appear black all over, even at birth!

The true Wild Cat (*Felis Syvestris*) is still found in the some remote parts of Scotland. It is in great danger of becoming extinct because of interbreeding with the domestic moggie (*Felis catus*). Many of these half breeds are spectacular black cats, but variations in colour between the tabby wild cat markings and the domestic cat colour do occur. In some parts of the UK large wild cats have been seen. These may be descendants from pumas or leopards that have escaped from captivity. In Fife, large brown sandy coloured cats were often reported, but recently large black cats have been seen and the sandy ones have disappeared. If these large wild cats really do exist, are the new black ones the result of mating with the domestic moggie?

It is difficult to understand the significance of the black colour in all these cats. Few wild cats of the world are black. The two best known are the Black panther, which is a black mutant of the leopard but It's spots can still be seen in some lights. The other is the puma, who's colour ranges from brown to black.

Siamese Sheep ?



The Suffolk sheep is one of the oldest native breed of sheep in the country. It has been in existence since late 1770.

It has a black head and ears, just look at the ear set. OK it doesn't have a black tail, but this is covered with thick wool to keep it warm, so if the breed does have a Himalayan gene restricting the colour to the colder parts of the body the tail would not be coloured. The parts that are only covered with short wool, the head and legs are black. Hence, a Siamese Sheep.

Perhaps we should go over to breeding these Siamese sheep. A ram sold for 90,000 Guineas at a Scottish sheep sale this year, and is now enjoying life in Wales. Kitten sales can't match that.

I will have to ask the Show Manager which class they have to go in at the Show, but then I shall have to steal one from the field at the bottom of the garden.

Over the last few months I have experienced a number of deaths in those very close to me, both feline and human. Ethel, my chocolate point girl, was the saddest of all as she died as a direct result of the small house fire that began my run of recent bad luck.

This led me to think very deeply into the experience of death, not a subject most people wish to think about. The following story I was once told came to mind and I would like to share it with you all. It may help to explain a few things or even allow you to think on a different level.

WHAT IS DEATH?

All day she was worried and tried to keep an eye on him, but when she was not looking his way, off he swam.

The sun shone, the sky was blue, birds were singing and there was not a cloud in the sky. He had never been in such a beautiful place in all of his young life. Something aroused him and he started to wake up. He was still there in that most lovely of places, but now he felt different. His back was tingling and slowly he realised something was happening to him. First his skin was crackling and then, bit by bit, it started to fall away. Then something very strange happened. First one wing, then another opened up on his back. Before he knew it he was flying away over fields, meadows and woods, mountains and streams, seas and islands. It was at this point he remembered his little family down in the water. He desperately tried to go back to them but he could not. He could see them through the water and knew that they were still there and wondering why he had not returned. He knew that one day they would join him and all would be well again.
